Their harmony, however, is disturbed by the arrival of Polimorfus (Poli) whose appearance and approach to life is very different to theirs. With gentle humour, using puppets, clowning, dance, and original music, these three talented performers show the effects of Poli's intrusion.

'Roll Over' is Pop-Up's fourth play specially devised for this younger age group. With its warm, attractive setting this colourful show will both enchant and reassure.

ALSO AT THE FESTIVAL

The Festival provides a range of activities outwith the main performance tents, some under canvas, some open-air. It has again been a priority to ensure that all activities described in the following pages are provided FREE OF CHARGE.

The zany Clown Jewels will be returning as well as some new Festival surprises including shows from Scotland's own Handyworks Puppet Company, more bouncy castles, roving entertainers, Lothian and Borders road safety and fire prevention teams with their fun. participatory exhibitions, run about games and discovery trails around the Festival site.

Festival facilities include a fully equipped Mothers' and Fathers' baby room, the Festival Crèche (weekend only), a First Aid caravan staffed by the St Andrew's Ambulance Service. the Festival Information Tent and a 'Lost and Found' waiting and collection point.

THE BP ACTIVITY PROGRAMME



Six completely new activities are introduced this year, all creative, participatory pursuits designed to introduce new skills and ideas, encourage active artistic development and stimulate the imagination – whilst having lots of fun.

These activities will be co-ordinated by a new member of the Festival staff, Rorrie Hiles.

Rorrie has designed an information sheet, available on request, which suggests several ways in which some, or all, of the BP Festival Activities can be used to create drama projects for the classroom.

Tuesday - Friday – the BP activity sessions will run from 10 am to 3 pm (unless otherwise stated) with each session starting on the hour. Places will be allocated in advance to mainstage ticket holders (see Schools activity allocation on page 11).

Saturday and Sunday – the BP activities will run from 10.30 am to 5.30 pm (unless otherwise stated) and will be open to all Festival visitors. Simply go to the chosen activity tent at the start of the session or sign up for a later time.

ENVIRONMENTAL GAMES

The environment sets the theme for our new range of exciting, fun games. As well as providing enjoyment this activity is planned to raise the awareness of many local and international concerns.

JUNK MUSIC

Musical instruments don't have to be expensive — learn how to make music from everyday materials. All instrument makers can then take part in a quick 'performance' — we guarantee the results will be unusual, to say the least.

MAKE A GIANT

In this activity you enter into the magical land of the Giants where imagination becomes reality as, in your own group, you help create and build a two-dimensional giant from a variety of card and materials.

LARGE SCALE POP-UP CARDS

Using basic pop-up principles and lots of imagination a variety of exciting images can be made to 'pop-up' out of your own 3D card.



PARTICIPATORY STORYTELLING

The storytellers tale is brought to life as participants create the characters, noises and surroundings that they meet throughout the course of the tale and set an exciting background in which the story can unfold.

RHYTHM/DRUMMING

An exciting opportunity to try out the different sounds and rhythms that can be achieved using a wide range of percussion instruments, and combining them in a short performance.

EDINBURGH CITY LIBRARY SERVICE

This year, due to popular demand, Edinburgh City Libraries are organising not just one, but two activities, 'The Story Telling Tent' and the 'Drop In Book Tent'.

THE STORY TELLING TENT

From Scotland to Africa, India and China – come and listen to enchanting and exciting stories from all around the world, with Helen East and Rick Wilson.

Tues - Fri 10 am, 11 am, 12 noon, 1 pm, 2 pm.

Scottish children's stories and songs never lose their appeal and some are presented here in a refreshing and exciting way by Theatre Seanachaidh.

TICKET INFORMATION

SCHOOL TICKET SALES

All tickets are £2.00.

In 1991 there will again be a priority booking period for schools. For every ten tickets booked we will again be giving one complementary ticket (for every four if there are special supervisory requirements).

The booking system is as follows:

ALL SCHOOLS WISHING TO VISIT THE FESTIVAL SHOULD INFORM US OFTHIS, IN WRITING, BY **MONDAY 11 FEBRUARY.** (You should not give details of which tickets you wish to book at this stage.)

Your letter should say (a) that you wish to attend, (b) include the school telephone number, and (c) name the contact person who will be placing the order.

From TUESDAY 12 FEBRUARY all school names received will be drawn and numbered in accordance with the order drawn. We will then contact each school by telephone, in strict numerical order, and take ticket bookings for all classes in the school wishing to attend the Festival.

- We suggest that each school appoint one person to co-ordinate the whole school's ticket order.
- An event number appears beside every performance time in the schedule. Please order shows by number, not by name.
- It is important to have alternative choices ready should your first choice(s) be unavailable.
- When your order is arranged by telephone you will be given a reference number. This should be quoted in all subsequent correspondence.

We must receive written confirmation of your order within 14 days of the telephone arrangement. This should include:

- Your reference number.
- 2. The event number and how many tickets you have ordered for each performance.
- 3. The number of children attending the Festival on each day broken down into age bandings of 4-7, 8-11 and 12-14 years.
- 4. A cheque for the full amount owing made payable to Children's Festival Box Office.

Do not send any payment if your school comes under Lothian, Borders or Fife Education Departments. You will be invoiced at a later date.
